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## Town Hall News

## **Town Meeting**

Annual Town Meeting opened May 7, 2007, at 6:30 PM with the first article accepting the Annual Report dedicated to retiring Selectman Philip Maddern. After the election of Field Drivers; Fence Viewers; Measurers of Wood, Bark and Surveyors of Lumber, town meeting accepted a gift of land containing approximately 517 square feet from Gary and Doreen Stevens, discovered to be part of the town way entering Mount Hermon campus from North Cross Road after survey.

Town Meeting also accepted a local option statute, Chapter 39, Section 23D regarding attendance requirements by municipal board, committee and commission members for participation in hearings. The statute allows an individual member to participate in voting on a given matter after absence from a single session of the hearing at which testimony or other evidence was received, providing they certify for the record that he or she has examined electronic recording of the missed session.

Reauthorization for a revolving fund for receipts and expenditures for the licensing of dogs was granted, as was permission associated with acceptance and expenditure of Chapter 90 funds from the State for improvement of roads.

Town meeting set the salaries of the officers as proposed, which included a 2.75% cost of living increase for all employees and approved the omnibus

budget for the operation for the town and the schools contingent upon a \$300,000 override vote, scheduled to coincide with Annual Town Elections on May 21st.

Two articles raising \$3,000 each were approved, one to add to the account for tri-annual revaluation of all town properties and the second for fees to allow the Treasurer to proceed with land takings for non-payment of taxes. Town Meeting also approved a \$2,200 appropriation of the second installment for the purchase of a used voting machine.

After lengthy debate, Town Meeting approved an article for purchase of a new single axel dump truck raising \$125,000 contingent on a capital exclusion vote outside of Proposition 2 1/2 and transferring \$15,000 from a machinery account.

Town meeting passed over the next two articles, one for the lease of the truck planned in the event the purchase failed and the other at the request of the Fire Department for employment of a full-time firefighter, not supported

by the Selectboard or Finance Committee.

A request for continuation of the Annual Town Meeting to JUNE 11, 2007 at 7:00 PM was supported by town meeting voters. The Selectboard assumes by that time Town Meeting will know the outcome of contingent override questions and the decision by Montague voters for their 86% share of the Gill-Montague District appropriation will also be known. A Special Town Meeting is planned to coincide with the continuation of Annual Town Meeting, at 7:30 PM for reconsideration of the omnibus, town officer salaries and the one-ton truck purchase should the contingent appropriations fail.

# Free Building Maintenance

Franklin County Sheriff's Department will be arriving in Gill the week of June 4th to begin painting the Town Hall. The program utilizes inmate labor to improve public grounds and buildings at no expense to taxpayers under the supervision of a uniformed deputy sheriff. The Town is required only to provide the supplies necessary for the project. Renaissance Builders have been gracious in offering the use of their ladders and scaffolding for the project. THANK YOU! The Highway Department will be preparing the surface by power washing the building several weeks in advance to allow adequate drying time for the paint to set and ensuring that the Community Service crew has enough primer, paint and supplies on hand to do the job.

#### Mariamante RFP

The Committee met and discussed the lack of response to the recent requests for proposals for the Mariamante parcel, including conversations with individuals who requested bid packages but then did not submit a proposal. The good news is it was not related to a specific issue with the parcel, as we feared might be the case. The Committee is in the process of arranging a meeting with a commercial realtor and contacting other communities regarding their processes for the sale of public land, although it is known

# Gill Fire Department

### Gill Fire Department Receives Mass. Department of Public Safety Grant

The Gill Fire Department received a Massachusetts Department of Environmental Management grant of \$3,900.00 to purchase and upgrade gasoline-powered rescue and ventilation saws. Grant funds will be used to purchase a new cut-off saw with diamond blades and equipment to make roof ventilation safer when using chainsaws. New guards fit over the cutting end of the chainsaw to protect firefighters and gauge the depth of cuts. Roof ventilation can be vital during a building fire to remove hot and dangerous gases from the burning structure.

# Student Awareness of Fire Education Grant

The Gill Fire Department received more than it requested to educate Gill's children and teenagers in fire safety and prevention. The Massachusetts Department of Fire Services exceeded the Town of Gill's request of \$3,017.29 by over \$300.00 this year. Grant funds will allow firefighters to present important fire safety lessons to children at Gills public and private schools.



Fire safety instruction ranges from teaching children in preschool and kindergarten how to call for help to dormitory safety for the Town's resident high school population.

#### New Defibrillators Needed

The Gill Firemen's Association is raising funds for new automated external defibrillators, devices that can restart a patient's heart during emergency cardiac care. Recently, the American Heart Association revised the procedures for cardiopulmonary resuscitation, which includes standards for more effective defibrillation devices. The Commonwealth of Massachusetts is requiring all first responder agencies to comply with the new standards for emergency cardiac care and defibrillation by 2008. As a result, the Fire Department must replace its current automatic external defibrillators with new equipment. So far, the community has been very supportive of this important task and the Gill Firemen's Association has made it a fundraising priority. The Firemen's Association will be selling concessions, including its famous French fries, at the Common People Concerts on the Gill Common on June 5, July 3, and August 7. The Firemen's Association will team up with the Friends of Gill for the Picnic on the Common on June 24 and the Fall Arts and Crafts Festival at the Riverside School on October 13-14

## **Outdoor Cooking Fires and Fireplaces**

Residents eighteen years of age or older may, without a permit, set a reasonable fire for the purpose of cooking as long as the fire is enclosed within rocks, metal, or other non-flammable material and safely away from residences and vegetation. The fire chief or his representative may issue orders to immediately remedy any dangerous condition, including extinguishing the fire, if the conditions of an outdoor fire are likely to cause a risk of greater fire. The Gill Fire Department appreciates the right of citizens to conduct reasonable and safe outdoor cooking fires and asks that residents take into consideration the potential effects of smoke or other fire-related nuisances upon their neighbors.

## Visible House Numbers Reduce Emergency Response Time

The Fire Department urges residents to make sure their house numbers are visible from the street. House numbers that are missing or difficult to read can increase response time in an emergency.

# **Instructional Happenings**

With one section of the MCAS behind us (Language Arts) we will begin the math, science and history sections of the test for grades 3-6. The MCAS results are important toward evaluating student progress and assessing our curriculum and teaching strategies. The staff works diligently knowing that the MCAS is an important instructional measure. Students and staff are conscientious and



take the MCAS exam seriously. Over the years, the staff has taken great pride which is reflected in the positive results achieved on the MCAS.

#### New Math Series

Everyone is encouraged with the new Houghton Mifflin Math Program and with full implementation next fall. This year, because of the mid year introduction of the new text material, the staff is working with their grade level professional development teams to cover certain units that would coincide with the state standards. This year's spring MCAS results will begin to play a role toward our collecting data based on the HM math program.

### **New Reading Program**

Thanks to the Gill Community, we are ready to purchase the updated Houghton Mifflin Reading Series. Our goal is to have the new reading material here before the close of this school year. This strategy would allow staff the opportunity to become familiar with the materials over the summer.

#### Inter and Intra District Choice

We have eight students requesting grade four and another four possibly for grade three based on low performance MCAS scores at Sheffield. Currently, we have four students from outside of the district who are now part of the inter district choice program.

#### Six Grade Graduation

The school year is coming to a fast close. The sixth grade graduation will be held on June 12th at 10:30 am. As a staff we have enjoyed the sixth grade class and wish them well as they move on to the middle school. I would like to thank the staff for their efforts to prepare these students as they move on to new challenges. The Gill staff is very caring and wanting the best for the children. Furthermore, we all appreciate the community's support of the Gill elementary school. I would like to thank parents for their excellent involvement in the school and the effort of the PTO to assist the staff to make each school year a positive experience for everyone.

# The Unforgettable Harriet Tidd

Harriet Tidd died on April 1st. Though I attended her funeral and saw her casket go into the ground, I still find it hard to believe she's gone. Harriet Tidd led a long and productive life, despite serious health problems and is missed by all. She liked to appear tough, but she was a pushover.

I will never forget the day I asked to get a copy of our plot plan. She announced that she would not do it, but would show me how.

"First, you have to look it up like this," She said, looking it up. "Now you need to turn on the copy machine, like this," she said. "Next, you put a piece of paper in the copier," she said. "Now get the page set on the copier," she said. "Now, just push this button, like this." I thanked her for showing me how to do it myself.

When the Friends of Gill sponsored a surprise retirement party for her in the Gill Congregational Church community room, the potluck celebration brought a great response, especially since, obviously, there could be no publicity. Harriet liked to take pictures, but hated to have her picture taken. I took photos during her party without a flash, so that it would not be too obvious. I did what she would have done — anything, to get the picture. I did not take a photo facing her directly, not wanting to catch her glaring at the camera, though she still glared at me, until I approached her to wish her well.

People often forgot, or didn't know, that she wasn't a Gill native. Probably because she knew more history of the town and the townspeople than anyone in town. She had an incredible memory. Her years as a correspondent for the *Greenfield Recorder*, her years of town government and librarian, gave her an intimate knowledge of many Gill residents. I miss calling her up to ask about people, places or things that

happened, long ago. When she was the town librarian, she once told me that you could learn a lot about a person just by the books they read. You can also learn a lot about a person by what they do. Harriet was a feisty woman, with a sense of duty, and a sense of humor. I like to think she picked April 1st to play an April fool joke on the folks in Gill who thought she would live forever. After 50 or more years of service to the community, perhaps she felt it was time to leave her tired old body. I hope Harriet knows that she continues to live in the hearts and minds of people who knew and loved her.

Here's a passage from L.G. Sorden and Jacque Vallier's Lumberjack Lingo: a Dictionary of the Logging Era that the children will de-code with Bob's help:

"It's five a.m. and the Gabriel blows. The bark eaters fall out of their muzzle loaders and head for the chuck house to bolt down a pile of stove lids with lots of black-



strap, some fried murphys or Johnny cake and maybe some logging berries. They dunk their rolling stock into their jerk water, growl at the hash slinger, pull up their galluses and head for the tall timber."

"At five a.m. the Gabriel was blown or an iron was struck with a stamping hammer and you crossed the dingle or raced to the cook shack, if the buildings were separated. You took the same place at the same oilcloth-covered table for all meals. You had to hurry or be the last one to leave the table. Some men could eat and run in five minutes; everyone was through in fifteen minutes.

Chewing your food was a mistake — you had to learn to bolt it. The cookee had the table set with tin plates and cups, knives, forks, and spoons, and no one left the table hungry."

"Pies were made for the midday meal and sauce was served for supper. One camp cook tld us his routine: custard pie on Monday, raisin pie on Wednesday, dried apples with raisin sauce for Thursday supper, and prune pie on Saturday. He also said prunes made better apple pies than peaches did."
