Dogs should be on leashes, and cats should be in carriers.

I will be at both clinics to license dogs. No late fee will be charged at the clinic on April 12.

Make your own Winsert

November 8, 9AM–12, Peter Talmage

FREE - "Winserts" are reusable transparent panels that fit snugly inside window jambs to add two extra layers of glazing. The workshop will be presented by Peter Talmage, who has been teaching people in the Renewable Energy field at GCC and elsewhere for many years. A properly-constructed winsert will reduce heat loss from a typical single- or doubleglazed window by up to 50%, thus more than paying for the cost of the winserts in less than one year. During the workshop you will assemble a winsert for a window in your own house. Please give the size of your window when you register so materials are available. The participant will pay for the cost of materials at approximately \$1 per square foot. Class size is limited to 15.



Gill Historical Commission

The Gill Historical Commission (GHC) meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 6 PM in the Riverside Municipal Building on Route 2. The Commission is charged with planning for the preservation of historical sites and records within Gill. The GHC maintains records and artifacts of Gill history in the Riverside municipal building. If you have information or questions about Gill and its history, please contact Kit Carpenter, Bev Demars, Stuart Elliott, Lynda Hodsdon Mayo, Pam Shoemaker, or Ivan Ussach.

While the GHC continues to gather materials for the historic register projects and to complete the digital inventory of gravestones in the three town cemeteries, we have been thinking about how the Civil War intersected with the residents of our agrarian town. The records of town meetings list the volunteers who filled Gill's quotas, and the first volume of Stoughton's History of Gill also gives enlistments and discharges. Simon Cady Phillips' diaries for the war years mention filling quotas, seeing off recruits in Greenfield, welcome-home parades, and funerals of those who died in Gettysburg, Spotsylvania, and other battles. Given some years ago to Slate Library, we have the engraving that shows the encampment of volunteers at Brightwood near Washington, DC. George Barney Hale's backpack is in the town's collection of artifacts as is a letter written home to his mother. William Glenn Boyle wrote descriptions of the memorial services for the town's veterans; conducted at both Gill churches, they included a sing-



ing canary suspended in a cage from the lighting fixture. We also note the veteran's monument in the center of town. At one point, a hand-carved flagpole and homemade flag were carried in memorial parades. During the war, the Ladies Benevolent Society knitted socks and sent large shipments to Union hospitals, particularly in St. Louis. The list of connections between Gill, its soldiers, and the war efforts continue.

If you have a letter, a diary, a family story, or any other artifact or information about Gill residents in the Civil War, the GHC would like to have you share them. We can transcribe or copy documents that may certainly stay in your possession. We are very interested in photographs of Gill's soldiers and will also copy them for our inventory.

Here are some excerpts of George Barney Hale's letter home from Baton Rouge on 26 March:

Dear Mother, Your letter found me day before yesterday, well as usual but a little ugly and the news from town meeting did not make me feel any more pleasant. . . . I have plenty of money yet buy nothing but tobacco that is two dollars and fifty cents per pound. . . . Never have fired my gun yet. There is some sick and one died last week. . . . I have had a good position offered me if I will go in for three years. The pay would be better than one hundred dollars per month. I will answer now – if it was ten times as much, I would not take it. . . . Our living while in camp is very good, salt beef and bacon rice beans potatoes and about one half of the time soft bread, plenty of tea and coffee. We get it raw and have to cook it or eat it raw.
