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# Town Hall News

## Fred W. Wells Trust Scholarship

Applications for 2015-2016 Fred W. Wells Trust scholarships are now available at the Town Hall, as well as at area high school guidance offices. Scholarships are available to graduating seniors and full-time college students who have resided in Gill (and other eligible towns) for at least two years immediately before application.

## Winter Sand for Driveways

The Highway Department keeps a pile of sand & salt mix at the Public Safety Complex for residents who need a few buckets for driveways and walkways. Use the driveway on the left (Fire Department side of the building), and look for the pile behind the building, off to the left. The pile may not be used by snow removal companies and other private contractors.

Please note that permits are only issued from 8:30 AM and 1 PM.

## Annual Town Election

The Annual Town Election will be held on May 18, 2015 from Noon to 8 PM at 196A Main Road, the Town Municipal Building, in the Fire Station. The deadline for voter registration to vote at the Annual Town Election will be 8 PM on Tuesday, April 28, 2015 at the Town Clerk's office.

Nomination papers are available at the Town Clerk's office. Twenty-five signatures of Gill registered voters are necessary to run for office. The last day to submit nomination papers to the town clerk is 5 PM on March 30, 2015.

# **Board of Assessors'**

The Department of Revenue certified the numbers presented by the Board of Assessors for FY2015 and set a final tax rate of \$16.85. This is based on 2 years of sales in Gill from July 2012 to July 2014 and the assessed values reflected on January 1, 2014. Tax bills have been sent out with a due date of 5 PM on May 1, 2015. This date becomes the deadline for Abatement Applications or Exemption Applications submitted for Assessors' determination. These applications may be found at the Gill web site.

The Board of Assessors has sent out Form of List questionnaires to be returned by March 1, 2015, to document all Personal Property subject to taxation in the Town of Gill.

The Board of Assessors is also continuing to work in the community to record project progress up to the January 1, 2015, the deadline date that becomes the basis of all the assessments for the 2016 tax bills.

Assessors' Clerk office hours are Monday through Thursday 9:30 AM to 12:30 PM. The Board of Assessors meets alternate Monday evenings at 6:30 PM. 413-863-0138.

# **Collector of Taxes**

Real Estate and Personal Property taxes were mailed to homeowners on January 20, 2015. The new tax rate for 2015 is \$16.85, an increase of 7 cents per \$1,000 of Assessed Value. # Gill Cultural Council

## Pellet Bag Recycling Program a Hit! -Preparation Instructions

The Greenfield Transfer Station accepts pellets bags for free from any Franklin County resident. WOOD PELLET BAGS ONLY! Please no feed bags, soil bags, pesticide bags, or stretch film. All bags must be empty and dry. Wet bags will cause the entire load to be rejected by the recycling company. Pellet bags are baled and shipped to Trex to be recycled into plastic lumber. Gill resident Ray Purington shares a tip: "I keep a pair of rugged scissors on the shelf above the pellet stove and cut open the top of the bag an inch or so below the heat-sealed area. I cut across both sides of the bag, about  $\frac{1}{2}$  -  $\frac{3}{4}$  the width of the bag, stopping in the middle. That way, the cut flap remains attached, and I've got a smooth 'spout' that doesn't trap pellets when I pour from it. When the bag is empty, cut open the bottom of the bag to release any pellets. Store bags flat and then roll or fold the pile into a pellet bag that has been cut at the top only. Do not ball up or crumple the bags."

## NEW Agricultural Plastic Recycling Program

The Franklin County Solid Waste Management District has been awarded a Massachusetts Community Innovation Challenge Grant and a grant from MassDEP to implement a FREE recycling program for agricultural plastics. Starting February 7, four Franklin County Transfer Stations will accept agricultural plastics for free. Any farmer within Franklin County may go to any of the four sites. For locations and hours, see www.franklincountywastedistrict.org. Acceptable items include hay bale wrap, greenhouse film, silage cover, maple tubing, and drip tape. Shake off loose dirt, stones, hay. Keep dry. These items will not be accepted: plastic mulch, garden pots, netting, row cover, twine. Agricultural plastics will be baled and shipped to Delta Plastics in Arkansas to be recycled into 100% recycled content trash bags.

## Do Not Throw Away Wall-Mounted Mercury Thermostats!

Updating to a programmable thermostat? Please do not throw vour old wall-mounted thermostat into the trash. These thermostats contain liquid mercury, which can be hazardous to our environment and health. Franklin County Solid Waste Management District accepts thermostats for free. Mercury is found in many household items such as thermometers, thermostats, some button batteries, and fluorescent light bulbs, including energy saving compact fluorescent bulbs (CFLs). None of these mercury-containing items should be put in the trash; they can all be safely disposed of at the sites listed below.

Thermostats and thermometers are accepted at the District office at 50 Miles St. in Greenfield. Hours vary; call 413-772-2438. District residents can also bring them to Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, held each fall, or to one of the regional hazardous waste collection sites at the transfer stations in Bernardston (first Sat. of each month; 9 AM-11 AM from Dec-April and 8 AM-noon from May-Nov), Colrain (every Sat., 8 AM -4 PM), or Conway (first Sat. of each month, 11 AM-2 PM).

Return the entire thermostat, and not just the mercury-containing ampoule since the casing provides protection for the mercury. Handle carefully and place in a sealed plastic bag. Batteries and fluorescent light bulbs, including CFLs, can be brought to transfer stations. Transport bulbs carefully; hand to attendant. Home Depot and Lowe's also accept fluorescent light bulbs.

"Clean Sweep" Collection for Bulky Items: Save the date: Spring "Clean Sweep" Bulky Waste Day: May 16, from 9 AM-12 noon. The three drop-off sites are the Buckland Recreation Facility on Rt. 112 South, the Northfield Highway Garage, and the Whately Transfer Station. Bring tires, appliances, scrap metal, mattresses, construction debris, computers and equipment, televisions, propane gas tanks, and other large items; also bring clean and dry (bagged) textiles and books for reuse or recycling. New in 2015: Bring bulky rigid plastics for recycling. Disposal fees listed at www. franklincountywastedistrict.org/ cleansweep.html.














# **Gill Historical Commission**

The Gill Historical Commission (GHC) meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 6:30 PM in the Riverside Building on Route 2. The Commission is charged with planning for the preservation of historical sites and records within Gill. In addition to its other projects, the Commission maintains records and artifacts of Gill history in the Riverside municipal building. If you have information or questions about Gill and its history, please contact Kit Carpenter, Bev Demars, Stuart Elliott, Lynda Hodsdon Mayo, Pam Shoemaker, Lynn Stowe Tomb, or Ivan Ussach (chair).

With funding through FRCOG, a well researched and detailed architectural and historical document has been filed with the Massachusetts Historical Commission in an effort to gain their nomination of part of Riverside for the honor of listing on the National Register of Historic Places. Bonnie Parsons, who has done the earlier architectural survey of Gill Center, Bascom Hollow, and Riverside, authored the nomination application. It is important to note that a listing of an area is an honorary designation and is NOT a local, and therefore restrictive, historic district. As MHC evaluates the possible nomination, they will work with the GHC to announce and hold open meetings so that residents may ask questions and be sure they understand what the National Register is and is not.

The GHC is also excited to have begun work on a comprehensive history of the Riverside area of Gill. Graphic designer Lynn Stowe Tomb and Pam Shoemaker are working with other GHC members to collect information about Riverside's development from the archaeological to the industrial to the residential, gathering pictures and maps, interviewing residents, and hoping to have a comprehensive book available by the end of the next two years. As plans progress, we will share details and let you know what additional information is needed.

The Gill Historical Commission met on Tuesday afternoon, February 3, with the research team for the National Park Service grant to detail a history of the Battle of the Great Falls in May 1676. Attending the meeting were Mashantucket Pequot Museum Researchers – Kevin McBride, Ashley Bissonnette, and David Naumec, invited guests – Joe Graveline, Howard Clark, Ed Gregory as photographer, and Shelly Small as well as Ivan Ussach, Lynn Stowe Tomb, Bev Demars, and Pam Shoemaker for the GHC.

The Site Identification and Documentation grant from the National Park Service, American Battlefield Protection Program (NPS ABPP) aims to identify the likely locations of the Peskeompskut (Turner's Falls) Battle—a major episode of King Philip's War (1675-1676)—and associated nearby



sites. A Battlefield Study Advisory Board comprised of representatives from towns including Montague, Greenfield, Erving, Northfield, and Gill, and the Narragansett, Aquinnah Wampanoag, Mohegan, Nipmuc, and Mashpee Wampanoag Tribes has been formed to oversee the study. Much of this massacre and battle occurred within the bounds of the present-day Town of Gill, and Tuesday's meeting with GHC began a collaborative process to gather information from Gill.

The long-term goals of the grant include, but are not limited to, the examination of the region's Native American community through documentary records and archeological research, gathering all relevant historical accounts of the day's fighting, searching for surviving battlefield relics and archeological collections, the collection of Tribal and non-tribal (Yankee) oral histories, and to synthesize these sources along with the use of military terrain analysis models. An additional goal is to engage the local officials, landowners, and the interested public in efforts to locate and protect this important battlefield and its associated sites. The Pequot Museum research team will hold periodic public information meetings, which will be announced in advance. As we all experience the cold and snow of this winter, we are sharing a few excerpts from **Henry B. Barton's 1885 Diary**. He farmed and lived in Riverside and served in town government for many years; his wife Emma Weatherhead was also a respected member of the Gill community.

Thursday, January 15, 1885: A steady snow storm has lasted all day about eight inches having fallen, this evening it seems more like rain. Threshing and cleaning of oats has been the principal item of business.

**Friday January 16**: A stormy day of snow rain and hail I picked and sorted over several kinds of garden beans for ext seasons planting killed several fowls and did a general variety of tinkering.

<u>Saturday, January 17</u>: Our long storm did not clear off till the middle of the forenoon. . . In the afternoon with both teams Willie and I broke a road up on to the mountain the crust has frozen fast and we had to break a track ahead of the team nearly all the way and only drew home

small loads. We have now about one foot of solid snow with a sharp crust on top that tonight holds up to walk on.

Thursday, January 22: One of the coldest days of the winter Mercury scarce above zero all day.

<u>Wednesday, January 28</u>: A regular howler snowed all day but cleared off just at dark.


<u>Thursday, January 29</u>: The coldest morning of the season 22 degrees below zero being the figure.


