- You may continue to drop ballots off at the drop box located behind the Town Hall, left of the back door until 8 PM November 3rd.
- The drop box will be emptied at 8 PM sharp on November 3rd. Any ballots deposited after 8 PM cannot be counted.
- On November 3rd, Election Day, the polls open at 7 AM and close at 8 PM.
- Polls are located upstairs at the Town Hall, 325 Main Rd.

Board of Assessors

The Board of Assessors has been meeting on its regular schedule by teleconference every two weeks since the state Covid -19 restrictions were put in place in March. Home visits have been temporarily delayed by Town Assessors and our contracted consultants will also postpone visits that will be done in the next fiscal year. Assessors are currently in a bid process, along with the town of Montague, to contract for appraisal of FirstLight Hydro Generation Properties. This work will reflect value to be used in the Quinquennial Revaluation of the two towns for Fiscal Year 2022. Lastly, efforts are being made to meet with the Selectboard and Finance Committee to establish funds for an additional Utility Appraisal as well as other plans they would need to complete in FY2021 in preparation for the FY2022 revaluation.















