# From the Town Administrator Gill's Electricity Supply Program - New Energy Supplier and Long-Term Rates

The Town of Gill has signed a thirtyfour month contract with a new supplier, First Point Power. Beginning with the January 2026 meter reads, the Gill Community Choice Power Supply Program, designed to meet the specific needs of the Town's electricity ratepayers, will continue to offer the same options but at new rates:

- A standard product that meets Massachusetts Renewable Energy Requirement (MA Reg) of 69.1% plus an additional 25% Massachusetts Class I Renewable Energy Certificates (RECs) at a rate of \$0.13852 per kWh.
- An optional product that uses 100% Massachusetts Class I RECs at a rate of \$0.15452 per kWh.
- A second optional product that meets MA Req plus uses an additional 5% Massachusetts Class I RECs at a rate of \$0.13132 per kWh.

For Gill residents and businesses who are enrolled in the Town's standard product, the current rate of \$0.15136 per kWh will expire and the new rate of \$0.13852 per kWh will take effect with the January 2026 meter reads. This represents a decrease of \$8 per month on the supply side of the bill given average usage of 600 kWh. However, this new rate is 3 percent higher than Eversource's Residential Basic Service rate of \$0.13493 per kWh for the month of January 2026. Eversource's Basic Service rates will change on February 1, 2026.

Gill launched its electricity program in August 2020 in an effort to develop an energy program that would be stable, affordable and incorporate renewable energy. From inception through June 2025, the Program has saved residents and small businesses over \$352,000 in electricity costs as compared to Eversource Basic Service. It is important to note that no action is required by current participants. This change will be seen on the February 2026 bills. All accounts currently enrolled in the Program will remain with their current product offering and see the new rate and First Point Power printed under the "Supplier Services" section of their monthly bill.

The Gill Community Choice Power Supply Program has no fees or charges. However, anyone switching from a contract with a third-party supplier may be subject to penalties or early termination fees charged by that supplier. Ratepayers should verify terms before switching.

The Eversource Basic Service rates change twice a year or more, depend-

ing on rate class. As a result, the aggregation rate will not always be higher than the Basic Service rate. The goal of the aggregation is to deliver savings over the life of the program against Eversource Basic Service. However, future savings cannot be guaranteed.

Eversource has several programs to help income-eligible families and customers needing special assistance meet their energy needs.

You can be enrolled in Gill's Community Choice Power Supply Program and still be eligible for Eversource's financial assistance programs. In addition, for residential accounts, if you have a heat pump, you will continue to receive the Eversource heat pump discount.

# New to Town? Changed Phone Numbers?

Are you one of the many people who have moved to Gill during the past year? (Welcome!) Did you recently add a new phone number to your household? If so, please be sure to sign up for the Town's CodeRED emergency notification service. We use

this system to provide residents with time-sensitive general and emergency notifications for such things as town events, changes to the trash/recycling collection schedule, hazardous traffic or road conditions, detours, flooding, emergency shelters, or evacuation notices.

There is no deadline to sign up. If you haven't added your telephone numbers (landline and cell), text numbers, and email addresses, visit the Town's website (www.gillmass.org), and click on the link for CodeRED

Alternatively, you can now use the text-to-enroll feature to sign up for CodeRED alerts. Simply text GillCodeRed to 24639. You will receive a text message with a link to the account portal where you can enroll cell phone numbers, landlines, and email addresses to receive voice, text, and email alerts. For first-time users, scroll down to "Need an Account?" and click/tap "Register."

To register to vote, you must be a U.S. citizen, a resident of Gill and at least 18 years old on or before the town meeting/election. You may register in person or by mail (postmarked no later than the final registration date). Vote

by Mail postcards for the state elections will go out later the new year, if you are interested in voting by mail for the Annual Town Election you must fill out an application for vote by mail available on the Town website. Applications are good for 1 calendar year only.

Nomination papers are available at the Town Clerk's Office after January 1, 2026 for anyone who would like to run for any of these offices. When you pickup nomination papers the clerk will explain to you the number of



signatures needed and the whole process of getting your name on the ballot. The last day to obtain nomination papers is Thursday March 26, 2026.

November 3rd, 2026, Mid-term elections.


# **Cultural Council News**

# HEAT PUMP REDUCED ELECTRIC RATE

Nov. 1 to April 30

- If you use a heat pump to heat all or part of your home, you can take advantage of a new, reduced distribution and transmission rate during the winter months (Nov. 1 to April 30) to help you save on your winter electric bill. If you received a Mass Save® rebate via your Eversource electric account for a heat pump you installed after Jan. 1, 2019, you will be automatically enrolled on this rate beginning Nov. 1, 2025. If you installed your heat pump prior to Jan. 1, 2019, you can apply at eversource.com/heat-pumprate.
- Municipal aggregation and

- third-party supplier customers If you are a municipal aggregator or enrolled with a third-party supplier you can also receive the rate. The rate is on the delivery side of the electric bill, not the supply side.
- Customers who need bill assistance - If you are currently on the R-2 Residential Assistance Rate and have a heat pump, you are eligible for the R-2 Heat Pump Rate, which provides the same discount you receive on the R-2 electric rate.
- Solar and net metering customers A customer that has solar or is net metered can participate in the heat pump rate.

# **Gill Historical Commission**

The Historical Commission offered its lovely books on Gill's history at the Fall Festival plus a new addition - a book by author, Liz Gardner. This book features gorgeous photographs of Gill throughout the four seasons, highlighting our very special surroundings. A copy of this book will be available at the Gill Library.

Including Gill, members of five towns and four tribes have been meeting with researchers since 2014 to study King Philip's War, 1675 - 1676, and the events of the day of the massacre in Gill and Turners Falls on May 19, 1676. As reported in the Greenfield Recorder and the Montague Reporter, on November 5th, the American Battlefield Protection



Program grant has completed its research. Its Advisory Board. coordinated by David Brule, held its last meeting. Funded by the National Park Service, the final report is available at the Town of Montague website. The Advisory Board followed an inclusive and inspirational model of group study, gathering insights from tribal and non-tribal participants. The year 2026 marks the 350th anniversary of King Philip's War, and several commemorations are being planned. Three educational panels of text and photographs about the research will be placed in Unity Park on the shore of the river, opposite the site of the massacre, in the next few months. On May 16, a Day of Remembrance will be held at the Discovery Center. Details of other events will be forthcoming.



# From the Principal of Gill Elementary

We have had a very busy and productive fall here at Gill Elementary. We currently serve 116 students across seven classes, with most classes having 15 or more students.

I am pleased to report that the third-grade students were recently able to return to their classroom after the electrical fire that occurred on October 2nd. Our school custodian, Wayne Ekert, was instrumental in quickly extinguishing the blaze, which prevented a much more serious tragedy. On a different note, our annual Bonfire Night was a great success. We extend our sincere thanks to Gill Fire for overseeing the event and to everyone who donated pallets.

Our Farm to School program continues to flourish under the direction of Faith Rand and Sorrel Hatch. Although the garden has been put to rest for the winter, the program is still active. Students are continuing to sample garden-fresh vegetables and are beginning to plan for next spring's garden. We are fortunate to have such wonderful resources available to our school community.

Finally, I wanted to share some personal news: I will be retiring as Principal of Gill Elementary at the end of December. After 37.5 years as an educator, I am ready to begin a new adventure, though I will greatly miss the students. I have cherished my 3.5 years at

Gill Elementary. My last day with the students will be December 23rd. A new principal is scheduled to begin on January 1st and will be in place when everyone returns from the holidays. Thank you to everyone here in Gill for your continuous support of our little school. It is a great place.

### Gill Elementary School Garden Club and Farm-to-School Initiative

Roughly a dozen enthusiastic students and their caregivers attended The Garden Club this fall. We met once a week after school to tend the gardens and learn about growing and eating our own delicious food. In addition, we had eight Garden Stewards from 5th and 6th grades join us weekly as part of a new afterschool program designed for students who are ready to take on more responsibility caring for our gardens and grounds. In an effort to connect our students to our local farming community, we took a walking field trip to Laughing Dog Farm where we herded goats, snuggled bunnies and tasted homegrown raspberries, kiwis and chestnuts. The entire school was treated to raspberry picking, generously donated by our neighbors at Upinngil Farm. As we approached Halloween, we sent every student home with a pie pumpkin donated from Bascom Hollow Farm.

The garden has now been put to bed for the winter, but we will continue learning about farming and connecting our kids to the land throughout the winter with farm-based classroom activities!

# Gill Elementary School Roof Project: Investing in Our Town's Future

The roof at Gill Elementary has reached the end of its useful life, and after years of patching and repairs, requires a full replacement. A reliable, weather-tight roof is essential not only for protecting classrooms and equipment, but also for ensuring that students and staff have a safe, comfortable place to learn every day.

The good news is that the Massachusetts School Building Authority will provide substantial financial support, which will significantly lower the cost to local taxpayers. However, the town would still need to contribute its share to complete the project. While Gill Elementary is used and operated by the Gill-Montaque Regional School District, the building is owned by the Town, and the Town is responsible for major capital repairs. Because of the size of the investment, voters will be asked to approve the project in early 2026. Ahead of that vote, the Roof Committee and Select Board will host an information session to review the project's scope, expected costs, and timeline. Residents will have the chance to ask questions, understand how state funds offset local spending, and learn about the financial implications and desirability of replacing the roof during the summer of 2027. We encourage all residents to stay informed and take part in the upcoming conversations.
