Frequently asked questions:

●When is my trash and recycling collected in Gill?

Trash and recyclables are collected in Gill every Thursday. Certain holidays, as marked on the curbside collection calendar, will move collection day to Friday.

●What is the cost to have my trash and recycling collected?

A Gill trash sticker must be affixed to every bag of trash. Trash stickers cost \$3 each. There is no cost for recycling.

●How and where do I get a recycling bin:

You can contact the Town Hall at 413-863-9347 to make arrangements to pick up a recycling bin. Bins supplied through a state grant will be free of charge (limit 1 per household), and additional bins can be purchased for \$5 each.

●I have questions on what to recycle.

●Can I use my own container for curbside trash?

Yes. See **page 3** for general rules and detailed curbside trash information.

●What if I have materials that cannot be put into the trash or recycling?

See **pages 3 and 4** for detailed information on what to do with items that cannot be put into trash or be recycled.

●What do I do with large bulky items that I need to get rid of?

See **page 5** for information about bulky waste disposal.

●What do I do with medications I need to dispose of?

The CVS pharmacy in Greenfield has a free drop-off box for unwanted medications. The Erving and Montague Police Stations and Baystate Franklin Medical Center also have secure collection boxes.

●Is there somewhere in town I can drop off batteries? Cell phones?

Cell phones, button and non-alkaline batteries can be dropped off at Town Hall, 325 Main Road. Alkaline batteries go into the trash. Staples recycles batteries for a fee.

●What can I do with leaves, grass clippings, and yard waste?

See **page 3** for several ways to dispose of yard waste.

HELPFUL QUICK TIPS:

7:00 AM: Please have your trash and recycling out to the curb by this time on Thursday morning (or Friday if a marked Holiday)

Refer to Curbside Collection Calendar: You will find the recycling schedule in this publication and on the town website. You will need to know whether it is a paper week or a container week.

Telephone, text, & email reminders for changes to the collection schedule are announced using the CodeRed Reverse 9-1-1 system. Sign up from the Town's homepage: www.gillmass.org or **Text-to-Enroll by texting GillCodeRed to 24639.**

Sort Recyclables: It is easy! 2 bins!

One Bin for all paper and cardboard

Please FLATTEN and BREAK DOWN cardboard boxes

One Bin for plastic, glass, and metal containers

Please EMPTY and RINSE all containers

Items that cannot be recycled and must be thrown in your trash are listed on **pages 4 – 6.**

Gill trash stickers can be purchased at the Upingil Farm Store, Spirit Shoppe, The Mill (Gill Mobil), and Town Hall. Stickers are \$3 each.

GENERAL RULES:
RESIDENTIAL CURBSIDE TRASH & RECYCLING COLLECTION
(only for Gill-generated waste & recycling)

- NO TRASH BAG OR RECYCLING CONTAINER MAY EVER WEIGH MORE THAN **35 POUNDS** AT ANY TIME
- A Gill trash sticker must be placed on the outside of each bag, near the tied end
- Trash is collected weekly
- Recycling is collected on alternating weeks – paper/cardboard one week, and plastic/metal/glass the next week
- All trash and recycling must be placed curbside by 7:00 AM on the collection day
- Trash & recycling must be placed neatly on curbside without blocking fire hydrants or impeding roadway traffic
- Truck routes and schedules are subject to change without notice during the day
- Recycling or trash buried under snow WILL NOT be picked up

TRASH COLLECTION DETAILS

Containers: The Town does not supply trash containers. Residents are free to use whatever containers they choose as long as each trash bag weighs less than 35 pounds. Every trash bag in a barrel, trashcan, or tote **MUST** have a Gill trash sticker. Trash in a container **MUST** be bagged; no loose trash. Residents may also place bags curbside.

IMPORTANT: Do not use **contractor bags** (too large & heavy) or paper yard waste bags (tears too easily) for curbside trash collection. These bags will **NOT** be collected.

Limits: Household trash can be placed in bags sized up to 33 gallons. Bags can weigh up to 35 pounds. NO “business” trash accepted.

The following CANNOT be put curbside for trash collection:

LEAVES & YARD WASTE DISPOSAL

Did you know? Leaves, grass clippings and brush (less than 1 inch in diameter) are banned from the trash in Massachusetts. (www.mass.gov/guides/massdep-waste-disposal-bans) There are several disposal options:

- **Composting:** Leaves and non-meat food waste can be composted. Franklin County Solid Waste District sells discounted home compost bins at their office in Greenfield at 117 Main Street. <https://franklincountywastedistrict.org/p/27/Compost-Supplies>
- **Mulching:** Grass clippings can be used as mulch – consider leaving them where they fall. Grass clippings left on the lawn will decompose and act as a natural organic fertilizer. For more information, see www.mass.gov/doc/dont-trash-grass/download
- Lawn clippings and leaves are accepted free of charge at Upingil Farm Store, 411 Main Road, Gill. The Greenfield Transfer Station, located at 86 Cumberland Road, accepts leaves, grass clippings, brush, and branches, although there may be disposal fees. - Large brush and stumps are accepted for a fee at Martin’s Farm, 341 Plain Road, Greenfield. The company’s website suggests calling for more information, 413-774-5631. <https://martinsfarmcompost.com/p/23/Martins-Farm-Services>

RECYCLING COLLECTION DETAILS

Gill uses “dual stream recycling” for its collection program. This means paper and cardboard is sorted and collected separately from glass, plastic, and metal containers.

Mixed Paper and Cardboard may be placed in a Blue Bin or personal container(s). Glass, Plastic and Metals may be combined in a Blue Bin or personal container(s).

ACCEPTABLE CONTAINER. You can contact the Town Hall at 413-863-9347 to make arrangements to pick up a recycling bin. When available through a state grant, bins will be free of charge, limit 1 per household. Additional bins can be purchased for \$5 each. Larger personal containers (such as a 30-gallon barrel) or wheeled carts also may be used, as long as the total weight of each container is less than 35 pounds when full.

If using barrels or carts, please label the container for trash with a “T” and the recycling container with an “R” to assist the collection workers.

Limits: There is NO LIMIT on curbside recycling but each container must weigh less than 35 pounds. Cardboard: Please break down, remove packing materials such as bubble wrap and Styrofoam™, flatten and fold or cut boxes & other pieces of cardboard to 3’ x 3’ & place next to your bin. *Boxes not broken down will **NOT** be picked up.

PLASTIC BAGS ARE NOT ALLOWED IN RECYCLING BINS because they get tangled in the sorting equipment. Plastic bags may be recycled at most grocery stores and “big box” stores.

ATTENTION

PLEASE KEEP THE FOLLOWING ITEMS OUT OF YOUR RECYCLING!

- Garden Hoses, String Lights, Ropes, or other “Tanglers”
- Rigid plastic packaging, pails, buckets, toys
- Napkins, Tissues, Towels or Wipes
- Compostable Plastics (PLA7)
- Foods and Liquids
- Clothing or Linens
- Hypodermic needles
- Aerosol cans
- Styrofoam
- Plastic Bags, Wraps or Pouches #1
- Shredded Paper

FOOD WASTE DROP OFF PROGRAM

The Town provides a Food Waste Drop-Off program, where residents can drop off their collected food waste in wheeled carts in a locked cage behind the Riverside Municipal Building at 54 French King Highway. HARD-TO-DISPOSE OF ITEMS

The Franklin County Solid Waste Management District’s website contains guidelines for proper disposal of other items such as Hazardous Waste, Mercury items, Lead Acid or Lithium Batteries and many other items. They also have special collection days (hazardous waste day every fall), a free sharps and needle collection program, and many other useful and innovative solutions for difficult-to-dispose-of items. BULKY WASTE

Twice a year, in the fall and spring, the Franklin County Solid Waste District holds its Clean Sweep Collection. Did you know that 95% of all textiles can be recycled or reused?

Broken zippers? Missing buttons? Stained?

As long as it's dry and not moldy...it's acceptable!

Don't put textiles in your trash!

Bring all of these items to a county-wide textile collection on the 2nd Saturday of each month from 10 AM to 1 PM at the Chapman/Davis municipal parking lot in downtown Greenfield. Items may also be brought to a Salvation Army Thrift Store or drop box.

Plastic bags or trays, black plastic, bagged recyclables, clothing/textiles, food waste/liquids, tangles such as rope or hoses, scrap metal, batteries of any kind, electronics, wood, medical waste, hazardous materials, explosives, toys, hangers, shoes, frozen food packaging, food bags or wrappers, plastic wrap or film, shrink wrap, tarps, diapers, human/pet or yard waste, tires or rubber, Styrofoam™, napkins, paper towels, tissues, plastic utensils, register tape, condiment packets, straws, stirrers, coffee pods, ceramics
