Subject: FERC Legal Costs

Dear Town Administrators, The FRCOG is exploring hiring Legal Counsel for the next phase of the FERC relicensing process for the Northfield Mountain Pumped Storage and the Turners Fall Hydroelectric Projects. We have had preliminary discussions with Attorney Ronald Shems from Tarrant, Gillies & Shems about the possibility of working with us to provide legal assistance. The hourly rate for his legal services is \$300 per hour. Attorney Shems is currently working with the CRC to advise them on certain aspects of the relicensing process so they are already familiar with the projects. If there is overlap with respect to services, we could split the hours with the CRC to save on costs. The legal services we discussed with Attorney Shems include reviewing and providing written comments on the Settlement Agreement and associated License Articles, as well as the Off-License agreement. In addition, Legal Counsel might also assist us with the 401 Water Quality Certification (WQC) process since we hope DEP will exercise its full authority. While the WQC process is implementing a federal law (Clean Water Act), Attorney Shems might need to consult with a MA licensed attorney since MADEP will be responsible for issuing the Water Quality Certificate. Finally, if all does not go well with the Settlement Agreement, particularly with respect to the erosion issue, Legal Counsel could help us with the Intervenor process. Based on our preliminary discussions, the approximate cost for these legal services would be \$15,000 - \$20,000. FRCOG staff will be requesting and hopes to receive approval for \$10,000 toward legal services. Would your town like to share the cost of legal services and contribute \$2,500? If all 4 towns agree, via a Memorandum of Understanding, to share costs we could cover up to \$20,000 in legal fees. Please let me know if your town is interested and I can prepare a Draft Scope of Services which we can discuss. We will also need to check with our Chief Procurement Officer about whether or not these legal services would qualify for a sole source procurement. If not, we will need to issue a Request for Quotes. I look forward to hearing from you. Regards, Peggy

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LEGAL COUNSEL SCOPE OF SERVICES FERC RELICENSING OF THE NORTHFIELD MOUNTAIN PUMPED STORAGE (FERC Project No. 2485) AND TURNERS FALLS HYDROELECTRIC PROJECTS. (FERC Project No. 1889)

Legal Counsel shall provide the following professional services:

- 1) Review and provide written comments on FirstLight's proposed Settlement Agreement and related Articles of the License to protect the regional and local interests of the FRCOG and host communities (towns of Northfield, Gill, Montague and Erving) including: (1) improvement to and maintenance of recreation facilities; (2) mitigation of erosion; (3) prevention of impairment to water quality and loss of farmland and cultural/archeological resources; and (4) protection/restoration of historic resources.
- Review and provide written comments and recommendations for changes to FirstLight's proposed Off-License Agreements governing certain recreational facilities.
- 3) Review and provide recommended changes to any counterproposals prepared by the FRCOG or towns.
- 4) If erosion is not satisfactorily addressed by the Settlement Agreement, provide a legal opinion about whether to sign the Settlement Agreement or not.
- 5) Review and provide comments on any motions to intervene and comment prepared by the FRCOG and/or the towns to be submitted to FERC.
- 6) Review and provide comments to Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP) on the 401 Water Quality Certificate and associated materials.
- 7) Hold 1-2 joint meetings with FRCOG and participating towns to discuss recommendations and answer questions.

Deliverables:

- 1) Written comments and recommendations for potential changes to the Settlement Agreement and License Articles proposed by FirstLight.
- 2) Written comments and recommendations for changes to the Off-License Agreements proposed by FirstLight to protect FRCOG and town interests.
- Review and provide recommended changes on any counterproposals by FRCOG or the towns.

- 4) If erosion issue is not satisfactorily addressed, an opinion should be provided addressing whether signing the Settlement Agreement will impair our ability to request that FERC and/or MassDEP require FirstLight to mitigate the damage to natural and cultural resources from erosion caused by the operation of the pumped storage facility.
- 5) Review and provide written comments on a motion to intervene and comment by the FRCOG and the towns, if applicable.
- 6) Prepare written recommendations for potential improvements to the 401 Water Quality Certificate.
- 7) One to two (1-2) joint meetings with FRCOG and towns via Zoom.

POLICY for DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS EQUIPMENT Less than \$5,000\$10,000 value

MGL c. 30B <u>§15</u> governs the methods by which surplus equipment no longer useful to a jurisdiction may be disposed of. Equipment includes motor vehicles, machinery, computer equipment, furniture and other inventoried materials and supplies, but does not include real property.

The value of a surplus item generally determines the method of disposal. For items belonging to the Town of Gill and valued less than \$5,000\subseteq 10,000, the procurement officer shall dispose of the item or items using written procedures approved by the Selectboard. [MGL c. 30B, \subseteq 15 (f)]

Methods of disposal for items valued less than \$10,000\\$5,000 shall be as follows:

A Department Head, Board, Committee, or Commission wishing to dispose of an item or items with a value less than \$10,000\$5,000 shall submit to the Selectboard in writing a request to dispose of the item(s). The request shall include a description of the item(s), the age and condition, the reason for disposal, and the estimated value.

After consulting with the Department Head, Board, Committee, or Commission, the Selectboard shall make the determination that the item(s) are no longer needed and/or are being replaced, and shall determine the method of disposal. The determination shall be recorded in the Selectboard's minutes.

Disposal for items valued less than \$10,000\$5,000 shall be limited to:

- Disposal of the item(s) as refuse or recyclable material.
- Offering the item(s) to other Gill Town departments, boards, committees, or commissions.
- Return to Donor If the item(s) were a gift or donation from an individual, organization or business, the Selectboard may opt to return the item(s) to the individual, organization or business at no cost.
- Charitable Donations –With advance approval by a majority vote of Town Meeting, surplus equipment can be disposed of at less than fair market value to any organization that has an IRS tax-exempt status by reason of its charitable nature. [MGL c. 30B, §15 (g)]
- Offering the item(s) for sale or swap to other Massachusetts municipalities.
- Trade-In when making a purchase. IFB or RFP should specify the items to be traded in as part of the procurement. (Note that it may be more cost-effective to separate the transactions by selling the surplus item(s) through a bid or an auction before or after the new item(s) are purchased.
- Public Auction, Sealed Bid, or Yard Sale Requires posting notice of sale (Town Hall bulletin board at a minimum, may
 also use Town website or other electronic media, or newspapers). Proceeds from the sale will be deposited into the
 General Fund.

The Selectboard may establish in writing any other appropriate method of disposal.
